




















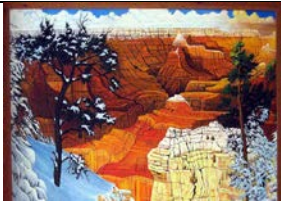
27. Beginning by Alan Snyder
